There are two medical systems in New Zealand; a publicly funded system which is essentially free to New Zealand residents and a private system for those who don't wish to wait, have private insurance or are willing to pay out of pocket. The private hospital system in New Zealand does not have to cope with triage, ER, trauma and chronic conditions, which are handled by the parallel public system. As a result, the costs for running a private hospital are much less. Savings on procedures performed in New Zealand average 60% from US rates with no compromise in quality. In addition to this, New Zealand is considered to have one of the safest blood supplies in the world.
